

Clive May gave a Report from the Deep Lake Foreshore Committee, on small changes to the camping ground. Advised that there will be no advanced booking for camping spaces. Fees still to be collected at businesses and that there is no fresh water until it rains again.

Work on the wind towers in the Dundonnell area is beginning, with some workers living in Derri.

We hear a good deal about the main players in our district's history but now and again a little is revealed about some who passed through and how they survived in those early times. Here is one such story, which by chance I discovered when a fellow researcher gave me a marriage certificate which she hoped would be of one of my relatives, alas it was not, but they shared the same name and both were from Somerset.

Sarah Ann/e VOWELS was this this young lady's name and she came out to Australia aged 20 years without any other family members in 1854. Sarah was on the ship "Joshua" which sailed from Southampton on June 24th and arrived at Geelong, September 28th. There were 340 immigrants aboard and many other single woman listed as domestic servants aged between 15 and 27, who were all employed on arrival, on short contracts.

Dr McFarlane, of Mt Elephant Bridge employed Sarah for 25 pounds p.a. and rations, with a sixmonth contact. Dr McFarlane was later to own **Eeyeuk** but at this stage was living near Darlington. Sarah Ann VOWLES married **William BISHOP** on 7th of July, 1855 at Keilambete -District of Kilnoorat Church No in Register 19.

William Bishop was a 26 yr old bullocky living at **Keilambete** and Sarah was 21 yrs still living at Darlington as a domestic servant. Both Sarah and Will were born in Somerset, England, Sarah at Butcombe in the Blagdon district in the north and Will in Crewkerne in the south of Somerset.

There is no evidence of children from this relationship and William is said to have died but no record to confirm this is to be found, not unusual in those times. Sarah's first recorded child born in her later relationship is named William in 1858, so it would suggest she chose to acknowledge her first partner in this way. On baby William's birth certificate it is recorded that she remarried **Roger/ Rodger COOK/COOKE** at Port Fairy in 1857 other evidence suggests they may have married at Wickcliffe but again no official record. Roger/ Rodger and Sarah Ann COOK/E then moved to the Amherst area where they finally settled at a Talbot on a small holding after a stint at gold mining.

They had 9 children -

William, John, Rodger, James, Mary, Frances, Richard, Florence & George. According to some evidence one son became a police officer another served as Mayor of Fremantle

(W.A.) while descendants include farmers, nurses, teachers and bank officers.

Rodger COOKE died in 1890 at 63 yrs and Sarah COOKE in 1903 at 69 yrs and are buried at the Amherst Cemetery.

Another young woman **Matilda WILKINS** was on the 'JOSHUA' and she is related to the **TOULMIN**, **STONE**, **LINDENBERG**, **LAKEY** families. (More on this in another issue)

CHAT WITH MR. JONAS JEFFERS, OF COBDEN. He was 84 and died the following year b. 1848 d 1933

Giving up bullock driving after a lengthy experience. Mr. Jeffers took up a contract droving bullocks from Mr. John Thomson's **Keilambete Station**, Terang to the Ballarat market.

Two men and himself handled the work and a covered in waggonette was used for sleeping purposes. They divided the night into three shifts, so that the bullocks, wild brutes as a rule, were always under supervision. The journey took four days, the first camp being at Darlington, and then through Chirnside and Logan's property.

The manager of Keilambete was Mr. John McKinnon, brother of Mr. Dan McKinnon. When store cattle were being brought down from New South Wales to Keilambete, Jeffers used to meet the drovers on the other side of Ballarat and pilot them for the rest of the journey. As many as 600 cattle under five drovers might be in the mob and there was a sigh of relief all round when they were landed at **Elephant Swamp (now Derrinallum)** under the Mount. Coming through Chirnside and Logan's property, the cattle one night started "ringing," that is wheeling round and round like a Catherine wheel, the beasts on the outside galloping their hardest. They flattened down a stonewall fence for some distance and all hands were hard put to stop the stampede.



Cr Brown said Youth Councillors benefitted from mentoring and guidance in event management, community awareness and personal development.

"Sitting on the Youth Council builds confidence and teaches young people valuable life skills in leadership, communication, team work and project management," Cr Brown said.

"It's a wonderful opportunity to learn about local government and what it does for the people of Corangamite Shire.

"Youth Councillors provide advice and recommendations to the Council on issues affecting young people and initiate programs to help in the development of young people."

Cr Durant said Youth Councillors would have a voice in what services were delivered to young people in Corangamite and would encourage their peers to take part in all facets of community life.

"If you're interested, fill in an application form and tell us about any involvement you have had in your local community—such as being on committees, volunteer work, action groups, school groups, sport groups or community groups—why you want to join the Youth Council and why you would make a good Youth Council member.

"We want to hear what you think are important issues for young people in the Shire so Council can act on what is important to the youth of Corangamite."

Each member of the Youth Council will be eligible for membership for two years with a third year negotiable based on performance, input and enthusiasm.





Noxious weeds to cop a spray

BLACKBERRY has been a thorny issue and tops a list of noxious weed Corangamite Shire Council is working to control.

Council's 2017/18 blackberry and roadside weed control programs are under way until the end of May 2018.

Mayor Jo Beard said contractors would be spraying the Shires' roadsides for a range of noxious and environmental weeds.

"When all weed treatments are added together, there will



be a massive total of 3693 kilometres of roadsides treated for various weeds in the next three months," Cr Beard said.

"The main weed species to be targeted include ragwort, sweet pittosporum, pampas grass, gorse, St John's wort, boxthorn, sweet briar, mirror bush, English Ivy and cape Ivy." Cr Beard said the budget for this years' program was more than \$218,000, with the largest proportion to be spent fighting blackberry.

"Almost a third of our Shire's economy depends on the agricultural sector so it's essential that we do everything we can to control these weeds and prevent them spreading to farmland."

Derrinallum Rural Fire Brigade

Thank you to all volunteers who turned out to assist with the Derrinallum Fire at the Recreation Reserve on Thursday 15th February. As a result of quick responses the fire was able to be put out quickly with no damage to personal, buildings or livestock. There were 10 CFA tankers in attendance plus one private firefighting unit. There were also 5 or 6 other CFA tankers plus the aircraft that were turned back when the major threat was eliminated. Less than 1 ha of land was burnt which was investigated the following morning, however no cause was able to be found.

A reminder to all Community Members to be alert and aware of what is going on around them. The CFA encourages people to be proactive when it comes to fire preparedness. Warnings and notifications come through a variety of channels, including the Vic Emergency App and website, http://www.emergency.vic.gov.au/respond/ via ABC radio and commercial broadcasters, via the Vic Emergency Hotline on 1800 226 226. These emergency warnings are updated regularly during each event.

At the beginning of each fire season, there are Community Safety Information Sessions held each year in both Derrinallum and Lismore, that are advertised locally but are not well attended. If anyone requires information these community meetings are recommended.

A reminder notice to all landholders, working in paddocks, to have a working fire extinguisher on their equipment and also be aware of local recommendations to suspend paddock operations when the weather is extreme.

Farmers will be commencing Stubble Burning sometime in the next month, so please be aware of smoke in our area.
